When the Hospital Sisters of St. Francis came to America to begin their health care ministry 140 years ago, it would have been hard to predict what their ministry would be like today in 2019. Thanks to the visionary leadership of the sisters, HSHS is a \$2.5 billion health care system that spans across two states and serves millions of people each year.



Hands and Feet Clinic Brings Christ's Healing Presence to Homeless in Springfield

In February 2019, HSHS St. John's Hospital in Springfield partnered with the Helping Hands Homeless Shelter to offer the first Hands and Feet Clinic for those individuals who utilized the shelter. The idea for the clinic developed during discussions in late fall 2018 between St. John's colleagues and shelter staff in response to concerns about frostbite, open sores and other health issues involving the hands and feet of the clients served at its warming center. During the clinic sessions, nursing colleagues from St. John's volunteer to wash the client's feet in warm water while looking for any health issues the need addressed. The nurses take notes and pass along to medical providers. For many clients, the warm foot bath is comforting and brings a sigh of relief. Others are brought to tears by the kindness of others. The clinic was held every other Wednesday evening through April at the warming center. When the warming center closed for the summer, the hospital and shelter partnered with First Presbyterian Church in Springfield to continue to hold the clinic at the church every other Wednesday evening from May through October. More than 140 homeless shelter clients have been served. Plans call for the Hands and Feet Clinic to continue indefinitely.

St. Clare's Community Garden Provides Fresh Produce to Litchfield Community

HSHS St. Francis Hospital partnered with several local organizations in 2019 to launch St. Clare's Community Garden to increase access to fresh produce. Montgomery County contains areas known as "food deserts," where residents do not have convenient access to healthy food. The University of Illinois Extension Office provided guidance on the plan, layout, soil testing and supply list, and the Litchfield High School building trades class built eight raised garden beds as part of a school project. St. Clare's Food Pantry, also on the hospital campus, was the local distribution center. Tomatoes, pepper, squash, sweet potatoes and herbs were harvested to supplement the food available at St. Clare's Food Pantry.



HSHS Western Wisconsin's Community Health Opens Community's Eyes to ACEs

From late 2018 to summer 2019, HSHS Western Wisconsin's 3D Community Health, along with other partners, provided 21 community awareness presentations on adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and resilience to approximately 840 youth-serving professionals from education, health care, community-based organizations and government sectors in Chippewa and Eau Claire counties. The goal in educating the community is to enlighten and encourage change. During the presentations, HSHS colleagues shared that if a child experiences four or more ACEs, they are twice as likely to smoke, seven times more likely to be an alcoholic, 10 times more likely to use drugs and 12 times more likely to attempt suicide when they are an adult. Participants of the presentation reported that what they learned they would be able to immediately use during their work to improve their service to youth.



HSHS St. Nicholas Hospital Partners with Local Food Bank to Increase Access to Healthy Food

HSHS St. Nicholas Hospital in Sheboygan recognized an opportunity to live our mission within the community by helping the poor and vulnerable who may not have access to healthy foods by partnering with the Sheboygan County Food Bank. As the food bank expanded their network and saw the demand to serve the community grow, the need for a larger freezer to store food was evident. By adding a freezer, the food bank is able to store more fresh and healthy foods for their partners. In response to this need, HSHS St. Nicholas Hospital committed to a three year partnership of providing financial assistance towards the purchase of a freezer and for funds to support the "food to fill the freezer" program. The Sheboygan County Food Bank distributes 66,000 pounds of food monthly to 15 pantries within their network, serving 3,000 families each month.

Payton's Story: Teen Inspired by the Science That Saved Him

In August 2018, 13-year-old Payton of Crystal Falls, Mich. was playing on a rope hammock at a friend's home after basketball practice, when he became twisted in it, fell and severely injured his spine. Unable to move and in excruciating pain, Payton feared he would be paralyzed. With multiple fractured vertebrae and internal bleeding, Payton was taken by ambulance from a hospital in Michigan's Upper Peninsula to HSHS St. Vincent Children's Hospital in Green Bay.

Once at HSHS St. Vincent Children's Hospital, Payton was seen by Dr. Hoon Choi, a Prevea Health neurosurgeon that helped St. Vincent become the first hospital in Wisconsin to launch a state-of-the-art robotic spinal surgical system. **Payton would be the first pediatric trauma patient in the world to receive surgery using this robotic surgical system, known as the ExcelciusGPS.**

Payton's surgery with Dr. Choi and the ExcelciusGPS was a success. In all, seven screws and two rods were placed in his back, and he was even able to walk the next day after surgery. Still, the injury was a huge blow to Payton. As an active student-athlete, he had to be sidelined while he healed. However, that down time is when he found a new passion – robotics. In February 2019, Payton and his mom, Kara, led the charge to establish a robotics team at his middle school.

"This is something that never would have happened if it hadn't been for Dr. Choi and the robotic surgery system," said Kara. "Dr. Choi has inspired, motivated and encouraged Payton to do this."

On July 7, 2019, Payton had surgery with Dr. Choi again to remove the screws and rods that were placed in his spine. Payton now plans to install one or some of those screws into one of the future robots he will build for competition.

"It's extremely rewarding," said Dr. Choi. "We've not only fixed him physically, but mentally as well. I want to see him do great things one day when he grows up."

"I want to be a pilot or go into the Air Force, either fly planes or work on them, so the robotics is kind of helping me with the engineering part of that," said Payton.

This year, Payton, age 14, now a freshman in high school, hopes to return to playing sports this year, in addition to participating in a robotics class now offered at his high school.



HSHS Medical Group Highlights

HSHS Medical Group continues to recruit high-quality providers to serve patients in our communities across central and southern Illinois. In FY19, HSHS Medical Group signed 106 new providers and will continue to sign more providers in FY20.

HSHS Medical Group has also expanded access to care through several digital tools. Patients can now schedule an appointment online with a primary care or specialist provider. Patients can save their spot in line at our walk-in clinics using MySpot on the HSHS Medical Group website. Anytime Care offers 24/7 access to a provider via a smartphone, tablet or computer for only \$29 a visit. MyChart, the online patient portal, allows patients to message providers directly, view their medical records online, request medication refills, and much more.



HSHS St. John's Community Pharmacy Opens in the Women and Children's Clinic

In May 2019, HSHS St. John's Hospital in Springfield opened the St. John's Community Pharmacy. Conveniently located on the first floor of the St. John's Women and Children's Clinic on Ninth Street, directly across from HSHS St. John's Children's Hospital, it is a full-service pharmacy that offers an easy way to fill medications upon discharge or after an appointment. The pharmacy also offers a large selection of over-the-counter medications. Open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., the pharmacy accepts most major insurance companies, including Medicare and Medicaid.



Northeast Wisconsin's First Breast Milk Dispensary Opens at HSHS St. Mary's Hospital Medical Center

In June 2019, HSHS St. Mary's Hospital Medical Center in Green Bay became home to northeast Wisconsin's first breast milk dispensary, in partnership with Mothers' Milk Bank of the Western Great Lakes. Located in the women and infants center, the dispensary serves two purposes: to have pasteurized donor breast milk readily available to infants hospitalized at St. Mary's, HSHS St. Vincent Hospital and HSHS St. Vincent Hospital in Green Bay; and to have pasteurized donor breast milk available to the public for purchase. The dispensary was made possible through a \$10,000 grant from an anonymous donor. In addition to dispensing breast milk, the dispensary also accepts donations of breast milk. From June to October 2019, St. Mary's received nearly 2,500 ounces of breast milk from approved donors.

Telemedicine Helps Stroke Patient Get Back to What She Loves

On March 4, 2019, Brenda and Garrett Graham drove to Shelbyville from their home in Robinson to watch their granddaughter play in a seventh grade sectional volleyball game. Halfway through the third set, Brenda leaned onto Garrett's shoulder. He asked if she was okay and she slurred, "I'm okay." Garrett knew immediately something was wrong. Two nurses and a police officer from Robinson and a nurse from Shelbyville quickly came to help.

Within 10 minutes of arriving at HSHS Good Shepherd Hospital in Shelbyville, emergency medicine physician Christopher Cruz, MD, took Garrett to a consultation room to explain what was going on and what the next steps would be. Brenda was having stroke. Dr. Cruz and Garrett were able to speak to neuro interventionalist Jacob Kitchener, MD, from HSHS St. John's Hospital in Springfield through a telemedicine robot, and the drug tPA was administered.

As the Graham's son and Garrett were on their way to Springfield, Dr. Kitchener called and spoke to Garrett to get his verbal permission to do a surgical procedure called a thrombectomy.

The next morning, Brenda started showing signs of improvement. By that afternoon, St. John's colleagues had her up and walking. Just three days after surgery, Brenda was transferred to a hospital near her home for rehabilitation. On March 19, just a little over two weeks since having a stroke, Brenda was able to go home. Not long after they got home, Garrett heard Brenda playing the "Star-Spangled Banner" on the piano. When she finished, she raised both hands, waved them around and said, "They both work!" Brenda plays piano at their church and was able to return to doing so for the first time after her stroke on Easter Sunday, April 21.

Garrett said, "The good Lord put us in Shelbyville at the right time. If we were anywhere else, her outcome would have been much different."

With the completion of its recent remodel, HSHS Good Shepherd Hospital now provides specialty care in the emergency department via telemedicine. The telemedicine services at Good Shepherd Hospital are helping provide the best care possible to patients and saving lives through the technology every day.

Telemedicine Programs at HSHS Bolstered by Federal Grant

A United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Distance Learning and Telemedicine (DLT) grant was awarded to HSHS St. John's Hospital in Springfield this year. The grant award of \$429,000 was used for purchasing telemedicine equipment in an initiative led by the Illinois Telehealth Network (ITN). These federal dollars was matched by ITN members and a matching grant from the Hospital Sisters of St. Francis Foundation. The total project represented an investment of \$504,700 into rural telemedicine equipment for 14 rural spoke sites. Many sites that received funds used the funds to upgrade their telemonitoring systems in their emergency department for telestroke services. Telemedicine carts and monitors stationed in emergency department are used by physicians to allow a tele-neurologist to examine a patient suffering a stroke to help expedite treatment decisions, reduce disability, help many patients avoid unnecessary transfers, and ultimately save lives.



Demonstrating Commitment to Patient Safety

In 2019, due to a mutual commitment to patient safety, HSHS and HSHS St. Anthony's Memorial Hospital in Effingham partnered to trial a new hand hygiene monitoring technology. HSHS selected SwipeSense Electronic Hand Hygiene Monitoring System as the hospital's technology partner to reduce the potential for hospital acquired infections by standardizing hand hygiene performance. HSHS St. Anthony's become one of the first hospitals in the state of Illinois to adopt electronic hygiene improvement tools.

Electronic hand hygiene monitoring is a new tool set that has become critical to improving patient outcomes, reducing costs and increasing patient satisfaction. Over 300 colleagues at St. Anthony's all wear a badge that automatically registers handwashing compliance. SwipeSense works in the background so staff and patient care are not disrupted.

Keeping Families Updated Through Technology

When a loved one is having a major - or even minor - medical procedure, there can be a lot of uncertainty about the status of the loved one. Are they in surgery yet? Is the surgery going well? Is the surgery complete? HSHS St. Elizabeth's Hospital looked for ways to bridge the communication gap between clinicians and family members. This year, they began offering a mobile messaging app for direct clinician-to-family status updates. The EASE app is able to send real-time updates to family members while their loved one is in surgery, the cardiac cath lab or intensive care unit (ICU). EASE is a one-of-a-kind mobile messaging app that is HIPAA compliant. It is available in both the Google Play and the iTunes App Store.



System BUILDING & GROWTH



Offering Comprehensive Cancer Services

Following approval by the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board (HFSRB) in December 2018, HSHS St. Elizabeth's Hospital in O'Fallon and Cancer Care Specialists of Illinois began construction on a new cancer care center that will offer comprehensive cancer services to patients in the Metro East region. The 31,000 square foot comprehensive cancer care center, located adjacent to the hospital's campus, is designed in a patient-centric manner truly making the needs of each patient a priority.

St. Elizabeth's is the only American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer designated cancer program in the service area of southwestern Illinois. This comprehensive and multidisciplinary patient-centered recognition, coupled with the advanced radiation oncology services offered in the new center, will bring innovative treatment and experienced cancer specialists to the community. The radiation oncology center is expected to open in early 2020.

New Prevea Medical Office Building Opens in Sheboygan

On August 12, 2019, the new Prevea Sheboygan Medical Office Building, located on the campus of HSHS St. Nicholas Hospital in Sheboygan, opened for patient care. The Prevea Sheboygan Medical Office Building is home to more than a dozen Prevea Health specialty medical services including allergy, audiology, back and spine care, digestive health, ear nose and throat, heart care, nephrology, neurology, occupational, physical and speech therapy, orthopedics, podiatry, rheumatology, sports medicine, surgical consultation, urology, lab and X-ray.





HSHS St. Vincent Children's Hospital Asks Community to Join the Fight

In February 2019, HSHS St. Vincent Children's Hospital in Green Bay publicly announced the Join the Fight campaign, a multi-million dollar, dual-phase community fundraising campaign to significantly upgrade its facilities and services to further enhance the care and experience for patients and their families. The community support was been overwhelmingly positive. More than \$9 million of the \$10 million dollar goal was raised prior to the renovation completion. On October 1, 2019, HSHS St. Vincent Children's Hospital unveiled the K.C. and Georgia Stock Pediatric Emergency Center (pictured left), a state-of-the-art pediatric emergency center located within the HSHS St. Vincent Hospital emergency department. The second phase of the Join the Fight campaign began in November 2019, and it includes improvements to the inpatient and pediatric intensive care unit followed by improvement to the child life specialists' work and play space.

Intensive Care Unit Renovated at HSHS St. Mary's Hospital

HSHS St. Mary's Hospital in Decatur renovated its intensive care unit (ICU) in 2019. The 12-bed unit, located on the second floor, more than doubled the ICU's size. It features three nurses' stations with direct views into each patient room and a more comfortable, healing environment.



HSHS Good Shepherd Hospital Renovates Emergency and Radiology Departments

HSHS Good Shepherd Hospital in Shelbyville completed a total remodel of its emergency and radiology departments in 2019. In the emergency department, the remodel enabled the hospital to create all private rooms, add consultation rooms and make the nurses station larger and the radiology remodel included a new ultrasound space with private, attached bathrooms.

IHA Awards

Two HSHS hospitals were recognized this year by the Illinois Health and Hospital Association (IHA) for dedication to patient safety and quality. The efforts of HSHS St. Joseph's Hospital Breese to advance patient care and safety earned a 2019 IHA Quality Excellence Achievement Award in the Small and Rural category. The award recognized a hospital initiative aimed at eliminating surgical site infections. HSHS St. Anthony's Memorial Hospital was recognized for its commitment to patient safety and quality with the IHA Innovation Challenge: Partners in Progress Award from IHA's Institute for Innovations in Care and Quality. The Partners in Progress Innovation Challenge helps support the mission of the Great Lakes Partners for Patients Hospital Improvement Innovation Network (HIIN) mission to reduce harm through impactful organizational innovation that can be implemented at other hospitals and health systems across the state. HSHS St. Anthony's was one of two awardees that will work with IHA to bring its quality improvement project, Journey to Sepsis Improvement, to another hospital in the state.

Press Ganey Awards

We are honored to have several Press Ganey 2019 Guardian of Excellence Award winners: HSHS St. Francis Hospital in Litchfield for clinical quality, HSHS St. Clare Memorial Regional Surgery Center for patient experience, St. Gianna Clinic in Green Bay for patient experience, HSHS Good Shepherd Hospital in Shelbyville for clinical quality, and HSHS Holy Family Hospital in Greenville for clinical quality. The Guardian of Excellence Award recognizes top-performing health care organizations that have achieved the 95th percentile or above of performance for over twenty various quality metrics.

Healogics Awards

HSHS St. Anthony's Memorial Hospital in Effingham, Ill. was awarded the Robert A. Warriner III, MD, Center of Excellence Award for the eighth year in a row. The center opened in 2010 and has won this award since first eligible, making them one of only four centers nationwide that have won this award consecutively. They were also awarded the Center of Distinction Award for the ninth year in a row for achieving outstanding clinical outcomes for 12 consecutive months for patient satisfaction, wound healing rate and other quality standards. HSHS St. Elizabeth's Center for Wound Care and Hyperbaric Medicine received the national Award for Clinical Excellence from Healogics, the nation's largest provider of advanced wound care services.
