

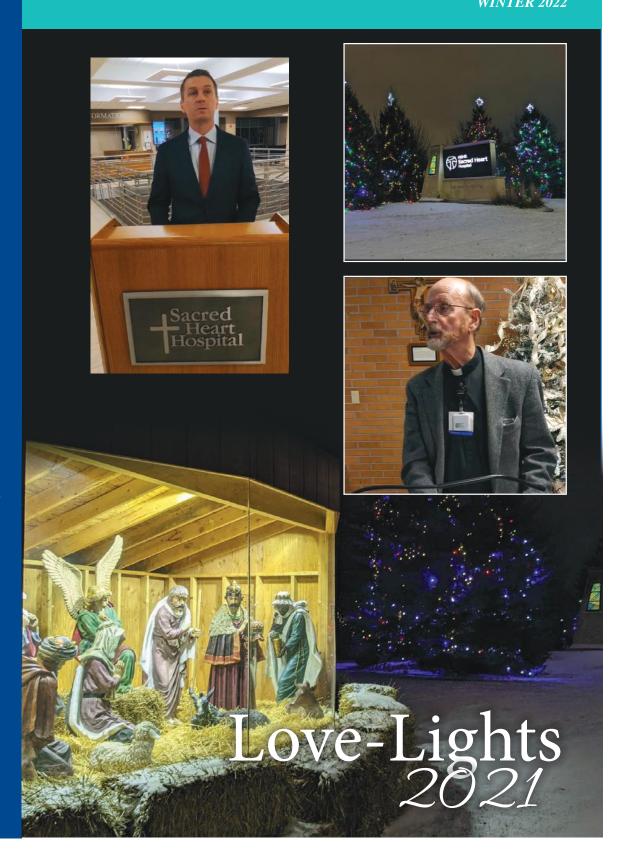

The 2021 Annual Partners of WHA (Wisconsin Hospital Association) Convention was held virtually on Oct. 5 – 7, 2021. Terri Donlin, Convention Chair, did an excellent job of organizing and presenting the Convention. Speaker Darcy Luoma, author of the book Thoughtfully Fit, opened the convention with an inspiring presentation. The business meeting was held followed by workshops. It is hoped the 2022 convention can be held in person.

#### **PUBLIC POLICY EDUCATION**

The Christmas season seems often to be one of immense activity, time lines, requests for various types of resources, and with all combined, a time often leading to a profound feeling of stress!

As volunteers, we have certainly experienced these emotions as we have attempted to modify the way in which we fulfill our mission during this time of pandemic.

I would submit that this Council and the larger Partners of WHA (of which we are all an important part), has offered a number of activities, primarily virtual, to help us manage and/or alleviate some of the significant change in our social behavior brought on by this ongoing COVID Pandemic.

In April, the annual Advocacy Day was held virtually to offer us all the return to normalcy by virtual contact with many of our legislators. Frank Sesno, formerly with CNN, summarized his COVID-19 research from numerous interviews he conducted. In summary, he suggested that we search for the facts about COVID-19 and be reminded of the story of the "Hero's Journey", which is a story of compelling characters who journey out to meet incredible obstacles to achieve a worthy outcome- survival. This story reminds us, and is embodied in the incredible work put forward by Nurses and the other hospital colleagues who embody the strength of those "travelers".

The first Regional Volunteer conference was held in August with an outstanding presentation by Annie Meehan on the H3 Culture; Hope, Health and Happiness. Other topics included 360 Degrees of Servant Leadership, 4 Secrets to Becoming a S.T.A.R., The Six Pillars of Brain Health, Understanding Palliative Care and the Resilience and Re-Entry of Health care Volunteers.

In early October, the virtual Partners Convention was held with an exceptional presentation by the CEO Panel, moderated by Eric Borgerding, WHA President.

Importantly, 2021 offered all volunteers to be engaged in our primary mission in offering our collective voices in advocacy; support for the work of WHA in furthering legislation that is reasonable and good for the citizens of Wisconsin. H.E.A.T (Hospital Education & Advocacy Team) issued 11 alerts this year, an opportunity for our volunteers to advocate for pending legislation. One such initiative came out of HSHS Sacred Heart Cancer Center, named Koreen's

Law, introduced as Assembly Bill 718. This HEAT Alert, in early December, brought out 2,500 voices of advocacy to put a stop to the "White Bagging" practices that hinder hospitals' ability to get medications to patients quickly and with less cost.

This is the voice of advocacy that all of our volunteers have within their grasp. There is NO good reason for not sharing your voice of advocacy through this simple response to action alerts with a suggested message to which you sign your name, and your voice is heard.

#### COMMUNITY HEALTH EDUCATION

Bronchitis is an inflammation of your bronchial tubes which carry air to and from your lungs. People who have bronchitis often cough up thickened mucus. Bronchitis may be acute or chronic.

Acute bronchitis often develops from a cold or some other respiratory infection and is very common. Chronic bronchitis is a more serious condition which causes constant irritation of the bronchial tubes, often due to smoking.

Acute bronchitis, often called a chest cold, usually improves within a week or ten days without lasting effects; however, the cough can last for weeks.

Signs and symptoms of acute and chronic bronchitis include:

- Cough
- Production of mucus which can be clear, yellowish gray, or green in color
- Fatique
- Shortness of breath
- Slight fever and chills
- Chest discomfort

If you have acute bronchitis, you may have cold symptoms, such as headache or body aches. Your nagging cough may last for weeks.

When to see a doctor:

- If your cough lasts more than three weeks
- If coughing prevents you from sleeping
- If you have a fever higher than 100.4 F
- If you produce colored mucus or blood
- If you experience wheezing or shortness of breath

Acute bronchitis is usually caused by the same viruses that cause colds and flu. According to John M. Wilkinson, M.D. at Mayo Clinic, this contagious virus spreads as the common cold or flu spreads. To reduce the risk of catching viruses that can cause bronchitis, follow the protocol of COVID-19 infection. Avoid close contact with people, wash your hands, avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth and get an annual flu shot!

#### GIFTS TO FIRST BABY BORN

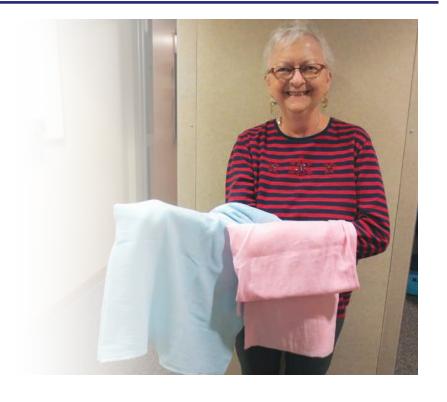

#### HANDCRAFTERS REPORT

The Volunteer Partners have taken on the fun project of having crafters in our area make swaddle blankets for newborns in the Women and Infants Center. In its most basic form, swaddling involves wrapping baby securely in a blanket so that only the baby's head is peeking out. The rest of the body is comfortably snug inside the blanket. Studies have been done which show that the startle reflex is decreased, which in turn keeps the baby from being "startled" awake. HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital Women and Infants Center will be teaching moms the art of correct swaddling.
