# Born Again by the Ocean Your support saved Saqora's life

The Skenadore family was enjoying the holiday season in 2019 when Saqora (age 12 at the time) began experiencing extreme fatigue and pain in her right side. Saqora's grandmother packed her up and brought her to the HSHS St. Vincent Hospital Emergency Department (ED) to see what could be wrong.

Saqora was previously diagnosed with Diabetes, which causes fatigue and possibly thyroid issues, so Marsha hoped it was something easy to fix. But after further tests and blood work, the doctors at HSHS St. Vincent Hospital determined the pain was from her liver and they found cancer cells in her bloodstream.

The doctors explained to Marsha and the family that Sagora had Cell B Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia (ALL). ALL is a form of cancer affecting the blood and bone marrow and gets worse very quickly if not treated immediately. "Had we not gone in that day, I do not know if she would have been able to be cured," said Marsha. In less than 24 hours, she had a port placed and received her first dose of chemotherapy. After a few days in the hospital, Sagora and Marsha returned home as her pain was managed and her fight against ALL had begun. One day, Sagora came out of her bedroom, walked to a chair and sat down. "I remember asking her if she was okay," said Marsha, "But she couldn't speak or walk. All she could do was shake her head to tell me she could hear." Marsha rushed her back to HSHS St. Vincent Children's Hospital, where Sagora underwent an MRI to see what was happening.

"I lost it when she went to her MRI," stated Marsha, "I was scared and alone, that is when Dr. Long came and comforted me." The MRI results came back and showed Saqora suffered from neurotoxicity, a reaction to her spinal tap medications causing her to lose the ability to speak. There were several other visits to the ED due to reactions to her medication. Dr. Long had to tell the family that due to their Native American descent, Saqora was unfortunately more sensitive to the medications, so they had to try other options.

"Saqora wanted to fight. From the day she was diagnosed in that ER room, she looked right at me and said, 'Mom, I am going to fight as hard as I can'," said Marsha. She battled difficulties with the spinal taps and mucositis, a side effect that made her mouth sore and inflamed. These problems required her to be on a medication pump for the pain and an IV to prevent dehydration. *continued on page 2*

### "She is my HERO! I cannot even describe how brave she is," exclaimed Marsha. "She kept fighting!"

About the staff at HSHS St. Vincent Children's Hospital, Marsha said, "You have to put your child's life in their hands each and every day." The Skenadore family had nearly 180 days inpatient at the hospital and got to know the staff very well. The Child Life team would rotate in during their visits, always there to help when her port had to be accessed. They also received gift cards for gas and food to help with the financial burden treatments were causing, along with referrals to financial assistance programs, as Marsha missed 25 days of work during the first month of Saqora's treatments. "Everyone was so supportive and made it so much easier and comforting for Saqora," added Marsha.

Throughout her whole ordeal, Marsha would try to distract Saqora by asking her what she wanted to do when all this was over. She wanted to visit the ocean when she won her battle with cancer. After **848** days (2 years, 3 months, 27 days), she had her last spinal tap. The Skenadore family packed their bags, rented a van and headed to North Carolina. **Saqora had won!** 

On April 23, 2022, Saqora's wish came true. She took her very last chemotherapy pill on the beach looking out at the ocean. "It was amazing to see her do that. I cannot even put it into words honestly," said Marsha, when asked about that emotional moment. **"It was like watching her being born again and I was seeing her for the very first time."** 

Because of **YOUR** support, children like Saqora have access to quick, excellent care; the compassionate caregivers to make a tough battle a little easier; and resources to make sure they don't have to worry about the financial burden of their fight and can focus on what matters, their child.

## **NEW CT Simulator for Oncology Patients**

Timeline for cancer patient care is crucial, and because of YOUR support, HSHS St. Vincent Hospital/HSHS St. Vincent Cancer Centers will have access to a NEW CT-Simulator (CT-S). "Our existing CT Simulator has reached the end of its useful life and will soon no longer be able to be used. Without a replacement, we wouldn't be able to plan for radiation treatment, and thus we wouldn't be able to use radiation as one of our advanced modalities to fight cancer," said Heather Gartzke, Chief Operating Officer, Green Bay Oncology.

A CT-S is a real-time, CT-linked 3D treatment planning system. This equipment features a CT Scanner, multi-image display, a treatment planning device, and a laser beam projector.

The new equipment will allow maximum accuracy for patients who will be receiving radiation therapy, which is more than half of the patient population with cancer. It will allow imaging of larger patients, faster scan times, higher quality scans, and the reduction of metal artifacts.

"To put it simply, the CT-S is a vital piece of medical equipment that helps us make sure we get a patient's radiation right," said Heather. "We have to be exact when exposing anyone to radiation, and this CT-S gives us the power to make it exact."

### Donor Funded Breast Milk Dispensary Continues to Show Tremendous Growth

The breast milk depot and dispensary at HSHS St. Vincent Hospital is the first of its kind in Northeast Wisconsin. This program serves as a site for women to donate breast milk, provides free pasteurized donated breast milk to mothers and newborn infants at HSHS St. Vincent Hospital, and offers community members the opportunity to purchase pasteurized donated breast milk for their babies.

The breast milk dispensary helps ensure that babies have access to the nutritional resources they need to survive, as breast milk improves infant growth and development, as well as strengthen their immune function by producing natural antibodies.

"Having this resource at HSHS St. Vincent Hospital is such a valuable tool to the community. All of this could not have taken place without the generous support of our donors. Thank you for keeping our community healthy," Keegan McKeown, Manager, Women and Infant Services.
