## Committee Membership

The multi-disciplinary medical ethics committees consists of physicians, nurses, chaplains and a representative from administration, case management, pastoral care, hospice, quality and the local community.

#### Case Reviews

The medical ethics committees decide which cases are appropriate for a consultation. Once a case is accepted for a consultation, the medical ethics committee discusses it at its next scheduled meeting unless the urgency of the case warrants a meeting before that time. Emergency cases are reviewed by the committee within 24-48 hours. Following all case reviews, the chair of the medical ethics committee or designee will notify all parties involved of the committee's recommendations.

- To ensure compliance with the Ethical and Religious Directives for Catholic Health Care Services.

#### Referrals

Referrals to the medical ethics committees are open to patients, families, hospital staff and physicians seeking guidance on medical ethical situations.
